
NEW Care Center - Skilled Nursing, starts at \$399/day

"And what was yours?" Beryl asks.

"The Gordons! That's right! You lived in the great big square house on the corner!"

"That's right. The white house. My dad was the president of the Tacoma Rose Society. We always had roses. Beryl, did you have brothers?"

"I did. I had an older brother. One year older."

"Mine were much older."

Somehow despite living down the block from each other and one class apart, their paths never truly crossed. But Mary says she remembers seeing the Cunningham's around.

"I was a tennis star in high school, "Mary says proudly.

"I was more musical," Beryl says. "I didn't play sports in high school. Well. A little volleyball!"

"I played volleyball too!" Mary says. "Remember the girls club at our high

school? The Stadium Diana's?" Beryl asks Mary.

Mary smiles. She remembers.

"And where did you go after that Beryl?"

"I went on to UW."

"So did I! What Sorority were you?"

"I was a Ki Chi Omega, "Mary says.

"I was Sigma Kappa," Beryl says.

"I played the tennis championship against the Sigma Kappa's!"

The two giggle over the memory.

Beryl finds it to be an amazing coincidence they have both come to live at Franke Tobey Jones.

Mary thinks, why not? They're both from Tacoma. It's no surprise they'd find their way back to a city they both grew up in and loved. Now decades later, they're just a hallway away from one another.
