March 15: The first patients are admitted to the new U.S. Veterans Hospital at American Lake.

April 29: Schoenfeld Furniture moves to 14th and Pacific, where its name would be a part of the Tacoma skyline for the next 72 years.

May 26: Aaron Robbins, owner of the Olympic Ice Cream Company, dedicates its new factory on E. 25th Street. His son Irv would co-found Baskin-Robbins in 1945.

June 11: Commencement exercises for the College of Puget Sound (now the University of Puget Sound) were held in Jones Hall on the new campus on North Warner Street. (Mrs. Franke Tobey Jones had given \$200,000 toward the

construction of the building that would be named after her late husband.

July 4: Estimated 35,000 people watch Independence Day fireworks from the Stadium Bowl.

July 16: The Franke Tobey Jones Home cornerstone was laid on a spectacular five-acre site with views of Commencement Bay and Mount Rainier. With a wheelbarrow and spade, Franke, at the age of 80, presided over the ceremony.

July 26: The first nine holes of the Fircrest Golf Club open. The course is completed the following year.





First Ever Writing Contest for Seniors 55+

In celebration of the Franke Tobey Jones Centennial this year, we are proud to announce the first ever Pacific Northwest Senior Writer's Showcase as part of Franke Tobey Jones Senior University. Entries can be in the form of a story, poem or essay and must relate to the theme "home." Entries should be no more than 1,500 words and be submitted in a PDF format that does not include the author's name or any other identifying information. The entry deadline is April 28, 2024.

The works will be judged on imagination, creativity, quality, memorable qualities, impact on the reader, etc. Prizes will range from \$50 to \$350, and the entry fee is \$20 for up to two pieces and \$20 more for any additional submissions up to two pieces per entry.

The six authors chosen to receive prizes will be asked to read their pieces at an event on October 30, 2024, taking place between 5:00 - 7:00 pm at FTJ. At that time, the winners will learn which prize they received. All authors/participants will be encouraged to come to the event.

Franke Tobey Jones will publish the chosen works in a printed book, and the top three entries will be posted on the Franke Tobey Jones website. All published authors will be given a copy of the completed book at the October 30th event, and a limited number of books will be available for purchase for \$25 at the reception on October 30th:
